Walking On The Water

Matthew 14:22-33; Mark 6:45-52; John 6:15-21

Following the miraculous feeding of well over **5,000** people, *Jesus* constrained the *apostles* to get into a ship and cross over the *Sea of Galilee* to *Bethsaida*, while He sent the multitudes away (*Matthew 14:22; Mark 6:45*). After *Jesus* sent the multitudes away, He did not immediately go to His *disciples*, but instead went into a mountain to pray, while His *disciples* were making their way across the sea (*Matthew 14:23; Mark 6:46; John 6:15*). *Jesus* is on the mountain, and the *disciples* are below experiencing a life-threatening storm. We are told in *Mark 6:48* that "*He saw them toiling in rowing*" This is a beautiful picture of *Jesus* above on the behalf of His people! What *Matthew, Mark,* and *John* record here is that JESUS IS ALL-SUFFICIENT, ALWAYS SUFFICIENT!

I. THE DISCIPLES IN THE STORM

Following the feeding of over **5000**, and *Jesus* sending the *apostles* across the *Sea of Galilee*, the next time we read of the *apostles* they are in the midst of the sea in a storm *(Matthew 14:24; Mark 6:47)*. Storms all through the Word of God are a picture of the <u>trials</u>, the <u>difficulties</u>, the <u>hardships</u>, the <u>struggles</u>, the <u>adversities</u>, the <u>burdens</u>, the <u>stresses</u>, the <u>setbacks</u>, the <u>afflictions</u>, the <u>battles</u>, and the <u>obstacles</u> of life. These storms are a part of life, they are inevitable, and can be very unpredictable! When *Jesus* "constrained His disciples to get into a ship and go before Him to the other side" HE KNEW THAT THERE WOULD BE A STORM, AND HE DELIBERATELY DIRECTED THEM INTO THE STORM! All the storms are in the <u>plans</u> and <u>purposes</u> of the Lord! The *apostles* went from witnessing a mighty miracle, into the eye of a storm, showing that a change of circumstances can come very quickly! BUT CHRIST KNEW ALL ABOUT IT, AND HAD APPOINTED IT, AND IT WOULD ALL WORK FOR THEIR GOOD!

1 The Storm Was Great:

John speaks of "a <u>great</u> wind that blew" (John 6:18). That which is "great" is <u>substantial</u>, <u>significant</u>, <u>extraordinary</u>, <u>large</u>, <u>extensive</u>, <u>broad</u>, <u>immense</u>, <u>enormous</u>, and <u>massive!</u> THIS STORM WAS BIGGER THAN THEM!

2 All Appeared To Be Out Of Control:

John records "And the sea arose" (John 6:18), and Matthew records that they were <u>"tossed (flung and hurled) with waves</u>" (Matthew 14:24). They were being thrown about, AND ALL WAS SEEMINGLY OUT OF CONTROL!

I The Storm Appeared To Be Working Against Them:

Matthew and Mark both record that "the wind was <u>contrary</u>" (Matthew 14:24; Mark 6:48). THE WIND WAS OPPOSING THEM! And as a result, Mark says that they were "toiling in rowing" (Mark 6:48). They were laboring, they were travailing, they were struggling against the storm, BUT MAKING ABSOLUTELY NO HEADWAY! THEY WERE STUCK IN A STORM!

There Did Not Appear To Be Any Place To Go:

Matthew and Mark both record "the ship was in the <u>midst</u> of the sea" (Matthew 14:24; Mark 6:47), and John records that they had rowed between three and three and a half miles (John 6:19). They are on the storm-tossed waters, and in spite of all their efforts are making absolutely no headway, AND THEY HAVE NO PLACE TO TURN!

5 There Was Darkness And Loneliness:

Matthew and Mark both record that it was "in the fourth watch of the night" (Matthew 14:25; Mark 6:48), and John says "And it was now <u>dark</u>, and Jesus was not come to them" (John 6:17). They were in a storm bigger than themselves, all appeared to be out of control, they were struggling but making no headway, they did not have anyplace to turn, AND IT WAS DARK, AND THEY APPEARED TO BE ALL ALONE!

(6) They Failed To Recognize The Lord In The Midst Of The Storm:

They could **feel** the <u>wind</u>, they could **see** and **feel** the <u>waves</u>, BUT THEY DID NOT RECOGNIZE THE LORD MOVING IN THEIR DIRECTION *(Matthew 14:25-26; Mark 6:48-49)*. Their supposition that the figure moving toward them was a ghost added to their storm!

There Was Trouble Of Heart:

Matthew says "they were <u>troubled</u>......and they cried out for <u>fear</u>" (Matthew 14:26). Mark also records that they "were <u>troubled</u>" (Mark 6:50), and John records that "they were <u>afraid</u>" (John 6:19). They were <u>confused</u>, <u>agitated</u>, <u>alarmed</u>, <u>fearful</u>, <u>anxious</u>, and greatly <u>distressed!</u> There was an inward <u>commotion!</u> ALL OF THIS WAS ADDED TO BY THEIR SUPPOSITION AND FAILURE TO SEE CHRIST CLEARLY!

II. DURING THE STORM JESUS WALKED ON THE STORMY SEA

Matthew, Mark, and John all record some very encouraging words concerning the approach of Christ to the apostles. Matthew says "Jesus went unto them" (Matthew 14:25). Mark says "He cometh unto them" (Mark 6:48), and John says that Jesus was "drawing nigh unto the ship" (John 6:19). HOW MANY TIMES, WE WERE ABOUT TO BE PULLED UNDER, AND HE CAME TO US! We are specifically told that it was "in the fourth watch of the night" that "Jesus went unto them" Mark says "And when the even was come (first watch 6:00-9:00), the ship was in the midst of the

sea" (6:47). But it was not during that <u>first</u> watch that "Jesus went unto them" It was not during the <u>second</u> watch (9:00-12:00) that "Jesus went unto them" It was not during the <u>third</u> watch (12:00-3:00), that "Jesus went unto them" But in the <u>fourth</u> watch (3:00-6:00) "Jesus went unto them" It was when every human prop was gone, and when all human hope was gone "Jesus went unto them" RIGHT ON TIME!

He Came Walking On The Storm Tossed Waters:

Matthew. Mark. and John all record the fact that Jesus walked on the water (Matthew 14:25; Mark 6:48; John 6:19). The very thing that the apostles feared, the very thing that was threatening their lives WAS THE VERY THING THAT GOD USED TO COME TO THEM! The waters that were tossing the apostles and their ship about, the waters that were threatening their very lives JESUS WALKS UPON IT AS IF IT WERE DRY LAND! Those angry waves which tossed the ship of the apostles and threatened to break it into pieces WAS A SOLID FLOOR TO HIS FEET! The ship is being tossed, by the waves, but JESUS WALKS CALMLY AND UNFAZED UPON THOSE VERY WATERS! Those storm-risen waters that brought such havoc and disruption upon the *apostles* had no effect upon *Jesus!* Those storm-risen waters that tossed their boat about with ease could not toss **Jesus** about! Those storm-risen waters that threatened to engulf the *apostles* could not engulf *Jesus!* He was not moved or bothered by the wind or the waves! By "walking on the sea" He was not telling them that the storm was not fierce, HE WAS TELLING THEM THAT HE WAS **GREATER THAN THE STORM!** God's people need to recognize that **Jesus is greater** than their storm! "Jesus went unto them, walking on the sea" and by so doing He was saying "*I am able, I am in control, I am what you need*" The **wind** is howling, the waves crashing and Jesus came walking majestically upon the water! "Jesus went unto them, walking on the sea" in His absolute supremacy and dominion! THIS IS A MIRACLE! Those violent storm-stirred waters that were working against the *apostles* WERE IN SUBJECTION UNDER HIS FEET! Those waters that tossed their boat about WERE IN SUBJECTION UNDER HIS FEET! Those waters that could cause such devastation, and threatened the very life of the *apostles* WERE IN SUBJECTION UNDER HIS FEET! God's people need to see that all storms are in subjection under His feet!

He Came With A Message:

Matthew and *Mark* both record that following the *apostle's* cry of fear, (as a result of their supposition), that *Jesus* <u>immediately</u> spoke unto them; "*But* <u>straightway</u> *Jesus spake unto them*" (*Matthew* 14:27), "*And* <u>immediately</u> *He* talked with them" (*Mark* 6:50]. *Matthew*, *Mark*, and *John* all record what *Jesus* said unto them [Matthew 14:27; Mark 6:50; John 6:20]. These words were <u>thoughtful</u>, <u>caring</u>, <u>sympathetic</u>, <u>kind</u>, <u>compassionate</u>, and very much <u>needed!</u> HE CAME TO THEM IN THEIR TIME OF DISTRESS AND NEED WITH A MESSAGE SUITED TO THEIR CIRCUMSTANCES AND NEED!

○ A Message Of <u>Courage</u>:

"Be of good cheer" (Matthew 14:27; Mark 6:50). This was also the message to the man sick of the palsy (Matthew 9:2), and to the apostles who were struggling with the news of the Lord's approaching departure, and the antagonism of the world, and their own weakness (John 16:33), and to Paul who was being threatened (Acts 23:11). This repeated message is a call to be courageous in the midst of trouble, perplexities, stress, anxieties, temptations, problems, difficulties, trials, infirmities, struggles, needs, and fears. In the very midst of these Jesus says "Be of good cheer" which conveys the idea of inward strength and firmness!

• A Message Of <u>Confidence</u>:

"be not afraid" (Matthew 14:27; Mark 6:50; John 6:20). Fear is "a state of terror, and a state of alarm" and causes panic, distress, anxiety, dread, and worry. Fear is very real and it is debilitating! Fear will cloud the mind, making it difficult to think rationally, and will rob the individual of joy, peace, and assurance. This fear stems from a lack of faith (Matthew 8:26). Fear is overcome, when we get a firm grip upon the fact (or it gets a grip upon us), that He is in control of every area of our lives, that He is God, and that He possesses all power! Because of our proneness to fear, and because of the serious consequences of fear, the message "Fear not" and "be not afraid" is repeated to the people of God, throughout the Scripture.

○ A Message Of <u>Power</u>:

He said "*It is I*" (*Matthew 14:27; Mark 6:50; John 6:20*). "*It is I*" an emphatic personal pronoun, the same as when *Jesus* said "*I AM*" From those storm-tossed waters came the voice saying "It is I" the <u>infinite, eternal, omnipotent, all-knowing</u> One! "*It is I*" the <u>owner of all</u>, and the One who is <u>higher</u> and <u>greater</u> than all! "I is I" the one and only <u>Savior</u> of sinners, the <u>Shepherd</u> of the sheep, the <u>Refuge</u> in storm, the <u>Miracle</u> <u>Worker</u>, and the <u>Conqueror!</u> "*It is I*", in the midst of <u>upheaval</u>, <u>instability</u>, and <u>uncertainty</u>, these were words of <u>relief</u>, words of <u>reassurance</u>, and <u>consolation</u> and were spoken as a reason for them to be <u>courageous</u>, and <u>confident!</u> For the <u>saved</u>, *God* is the reason not to fear (*Genesis 15:1; 21:17; 26:24; 42:23; Exodus 20:20; Deuteronomy 31:6, 8; Isaiah 35:4; 41:13,14; 43:1, 5*).

• A Message Of Invitation:

When **Peter** heard the voice of **Jesus**, he wanted to join Him on the water **(Matthew 14:28)**, and **Jesus** said "Come" **(Matthew 14:29)**. With the <u>winds</u> howling and swirling, and the <u>waves</u> crashing, **Jesus** walking on the storm-tossed waters says "Come" This was a call for **Peter to leave where he was, and to draw near to Christ!** THIS WAS THE SOLUTION AND REMEDY TO THEIR FEAR! "Come" this is a <u>gracious</u> and <u>merciful</u> word, a word containing great <u>opportunity</u> and <u>possibility!</u>

When the storms are howling and the waves are crashing, and all appears to be out of control, and in jeopardy, we need to remember that JESUS IS THE MASTER OF THE STORM, and we need to see Him walking on our storm, realizing that HE IS GREATER THAN THE STORM, and in the midst of it all we need to hear and recognize His voice calling us to Himself!

III. THE POSSIBILITY THAT EXISTS IN THE STORM

Peter Walks On The Stormy Sea:

It is dark, and there is a storm on the sea, one violent wave after another, the winds are blowing, the boat is being tossed about, **Jesus** came in the darkness walking majestically upon the storm tossed waters, with a message for the **apostles** "Be of good cheer; it is I, be not afraid" **Peter** responded to the words of **Jesus**, and then **Jesus** invited **Peter** to come to Him. In obedience to **Christ's** invitation, **Peter** stepped out of the boat into the raging waves, **AND WALKED ON HIS STORM TOWARD CHRIST** (**Matthew 14:29**). **Peter** began his **miraculous walk**, by **unquestioning, and unhesitating obedience** to **Christ's** invitation, and **by faith, and a willingness** to **leave where he was, drawing near to Christ. Peter** continued his **miraculous walk** by **concentrating, and by focusing upon Christ!** With **Christ** as his focus, rather than the winds and the waves, HE WAS ABLE TO WALK ON HIS STORM! In the midst of the storm, this is a possibility! **THANK GOD FOR THE WATER WALKING TIMES!**

2 Peter's Failure:

Peter is walking on the wind-stirred, turbulent waters, and his focus shifted from **Christ** to the storm, "but when he saw the wind boisterous" Physical sight began to dominate, and he is now focused upon the angry sea, and the white caps on the waves, and he hears the roaring of the wind, and **faith gave way to <u>fear</u> and <u>panic</u>**, and as a result he began to sink (Matthew 14:30). HIS HUMANITY GOT IN THE WAY OF HIS FAITH! Suddenly A WALKING ON WATER TIME, BECAME A SINKING TIME! Instead of conquering the storm, HE IS CONQUERED BY THE STORM! This is the result of **Peter's** failure to stay focused upon **Christ**, which was due to a lack of faith, and to doubt (Matthew 14:31). As a result of a shift in focus, from **Christ**, to the **storm-tossed waters** there was uncertainty on **Peter's** part.

B The Remedy For Sinking Times:

The remedy for such times is revealed in what happened next "and beginning to sink, he cried, saying, Lord, save me" (Matthew 14:30). As soon as **Peter** began to sink, he cried out, not to the **apostles** in the boat, but HE REFOCUSED UPON CHRIST AND CRIED OUT TO HIM! "And immediately Jesus stretched forth His hand, and caught him" (Matthew 14:31). It was not **Peter's** swimming ability that got him out of trouble, but Jesus took hold of him! The difference between walking on water times and sinking times is a matter of faith! REFOCUS UPON CHRIST IN SINKING TIMES, AND SINKING TIMES BECOME WALKING ON WATER TIMES! Whether it was a walking on water time, or a sinking time, CHRIST WAS IN THE SAME PLACE!

Jesus came into their boat "and the wind ceased" (Matthew 14:32). That wind that caused the waters to <u>rise</u>, "ceased" That wind that caused the waters to <u>beat</u> violently into that boat "ceased" That wind that caused their boat to be <u>tossed</u> about, that wind that was <u>blowing</u> against them "ceased" That wind that caused them such <u>fatigue</u> and <u>fear</u> "ceased" This led the *disciples* to worship and to further recognize-"Of a truth thou art the Son of God" (Matthew 14:33). THEY WORSHIPPED AND ACKNOWLEDGED CHRIST, AS A RESULT OF BEING IMPRESSED WITH HIS AWESOMENESS! Christ is greater than the storm, and He enables His own, to walk as He walked on the storm!
